
Christian Values

Class 4 have been using mixed media to create Ancient Egyptian Headdresses.




Class 5

Act of Worship News

This week's focus has been on Jesus preparing for His ministry. We started by looking at the role of John the Baptist, teaching the people that the Messiah would come. We looked at the story of Jesus' baptism and noted that this is recorded in all four gospels (Matthew, Mark, Luke and John).

What's going on this week?

Facebook has announced a new policy banning all artificial intelligence (AI) created videos that are likely to mislead viewers into thinking someone said words that they didn't actually say. The new policy will mean that all videos that have been edited in ways that are likely to mislead someone into thinking that a person in a video said words that they didn't really say, or, if people or objects are placed onto a video, making them appear to be real, will be removed from both Facebook and Instagram (which is owned by Facebook).

Main question: Can you ever trust what you view online?

Listen, think, share

- Look at this week's poster and talk about the different websites there are to find information, this could be news or videos. Talk about how we know if the information on them is true? Is it easy to tell if videos are real? Should we always believe videos?
- Ask the children what they know about fake news. Explain
 that the internet is very hard to monitor! Lots of people are
 creating and sharing information, some of it is true but
 sometimes it isn't sharing untrue news stories is known as
 fake news. Ask if anyone has heard of deepfake videos?
 Explain that these are a new type of video that have been
 created by recreating a person's appearance or voice through
 artificial intelligence. They can be very realistic, and with
 some it's almost impossible to tell that they aren't real!
- The social media company Facebook have announced that they are going to ban deepfake videos. Watch this week's useful video, which explains what a deepfake video is. Do you think Facebook have made the right decision to ban these videos? Do you think it will be hard for them to tell which are real and which are fake?
- Read through the information found on the assembly resource which provides an overview of deepfake videos and offers some tips on how to spot fake news and deepfake videos. Do you think more laws should be in place to help stop fake news quicker?

Reflection

As technology improves, so do the possibilities to use it more easily in our everyday lives. Some people may choose to misuse this to spread misinformation. It's important to be aware and to check what we read and see online.
