




Class 3 were joined by Sue Salter this week to help us make the letters for the 200 year celebration mosaic! We had to be very precise - it was quite tricky!



Sleep needed: 9.25-10.25 hours/night (NHS); Games content: PEGI 12; BBFC 12A, 12; Screen time: progressing from 1 hour/day to 1.5 hours/day as children get older.
