


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Chevening (St Botolph's) CE Primary School Special Report: Parent Survey 2018-19

Headlines

Thank you to all the parents/carers who contributed to this year's survey. This year we have used a digital format, to see if it was helpful in terms of completion and analysis. The school's Senior Leaders have started to look at the results, comparing responses to questions over time, but also looking at some of the helpful comments made, so that opinions, findings and suggestions can be carefully considered and used to help make future decisions, plans and actions. Some initial findings from the 55 separate responses are shared below, but you will also see us making responses in future Newsletters, policies and procedures.



agreeing. This is an increase from the previous year's results, which is positive. However, we want to ensure that ALL children feel safe and happy in school, so that they are able to learn well and flourish. We will continue to emphasise this in our plans and processes, including seeking direct feedback from the children. My child makes good progress at this school. The second question focused on the progress made by individual children. This linked to a subsequent question about the way progress is reported to parents. Whilst a large majority (89%) of responses confirmed that good progress is made, only 73% of responses agreed that the information reported is valuable (with some 13% of responses recorded as 'Don't know'). This disparity means we need to look at our termly reports, to make sure they give clear information about children's progress and attainment. Families with older children will be aware that there have been many changes in national assessment processes over the years, brought about by the Government. As a school, we want to ensure that we provide regular and helpful information to parents, so that they can fully support their child's learning and progress.
